Focus for the Week: Turn the Other Cheek Matthew 5: 38-48 Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

This Sunday's gospel was perhaps one of the most famous of all - Jesus tells his disciples to turn the other cheek.

We are told to love as God loves; that is, all people, even those we do not like and who do not like us. It is easy to be kind to those who are kind to us but God wants us to help build his kingdom here on Earth by being kind, loving and forgiving to those who hurt us too.

In the Lord's Prayer we ask God to forgive us, as we forgive those who trespass against us. If we want forgiveness and understanding for our sins, we must first show that same forgiveness and understanding to others.

## Value Focus: Diversity - Week 4

Accepting others ideas and world views often takes effort, perhaps because of our restricted understanding of where these beliefs stem or the cultures from which they arise. However, once we make the effort to be open to new perspectives so often our acceptance increases of others as simply being human too. We are indeed fortunate to be living in a digital age that allows us to experience other cultures and perspectives virtually.

Ultimately, being able "to walk in someone else's shoes" as the saying goes, allows us to see the "humanness" of a variety of thoughts and actions. Whatever the country or culture - no one set of values beliefs or viewpoints has got it perfect all of the time. Beyond knowing what is basically right from wrong, we are all susceptible to human frailty, impulses and emotion, timeframes and immediate needs. Knowing this should lead us to accept everyone.


