Learner Agency

The concept of learner agency has had a profound impact on modern educational theory and practice. One way of thinking of learner agency is when learners have "the power to act". Agency is when learning involves the activity and the initiative of the learner. In the past, schools have catered mostly for groups of learners, for classes of kids, with a one size fits all approach. Current educational practice is moving the learners from being passive recipients to being much more active in the learning process, and actively involved in the decisions about the learning. This approach is more a partnership for learning between teacher and learner. This is learner agency.

This Term we are offering a Ministry of Education programme Accelerated Learning In Mathematics (ALIM). At the heart of this programme is learner agency and equipping the students with the skills, knowledge and attitudes to take an active role in their mathematics learning. Working in partnership with their teacher students are working on an individualised programme to accelerate their learning in mathematics. These students will be taking an active role in their learning through: participating in rich learning discussions, being challenged and extended by the teacher, being immersed in a variety of resources working collaboratively through problem solving challenges using learning progressions as a road

map for their learning and setting themselves realistic achievable learning goals.

The teacher's role is crucial to help our students develop learner agency.

Learner agency involves the initiative and self-belief of the learners. The learners need to believe that their behaviour and attitude is going to make a difference for them in their learning. To achieve this the teachers work closely with their students to build a positive relationship and develop a positive learning culture in their classrooms.

Learner agency is interdependent. Teachers support students to understand that learning is not done in isolation. Learners need to understand how their environment and people can impact on their learning decisions and actions.

The social aspect of the learning process is important for learners to understand. Teachers support their learners to developing an awareness of the responsibility of one's own actions on the environment and on others is important. Every decision a learner makes, and action she or he takes, will impact on the thinking, behaviour or decisions of others.
