Jesus meets our physical and spiritual needs daily. All we have to do is listen to the Word of the Lord during our lives and allow ourselves to be filled with His love.

Mrs Kay Petchell - Digital Technologies Curriculum

Last week I had the opportunity to go along to the launch of the new Digital Technologies Curriculum. I confess, that I went along with a curious mindset thinking that it was all going to be about devices but was prepared to be bored! I was so pleasantly surprised to find that much of what is suggested we do already - it is just that we need to think about it in a different way. For instance, we need to call 5+1 an algorithm and think of it as an instruction "Get 5 things

and add one more". I learned how to program without using a computer (a fall about laughing experience) and how barcodes work. The whole goal behind the curriculum is to turn us from being users of technology to being able to manipulate it to meet our purpose. I came away really excited about the curriculum, knowing that we don't have to provide any extra devices, and our children are going to really benefit from it without having to have any extra screen time.

While on the subject of screen time, please remember that your children are not old enough to be on line, communicating with others unsupervised. Doing so is like dropping them off in the middle of a city at night and hoping they will make their way back to you unscathed. Children need to have the emotional maturity to cope with the nastiness that can guickly occur in an online environment that is why most social media sites require a minimum age to join up.
