Focus for the Week: I Am With You - Matthew 18: 18-20

Twenty Third Sunday in Ordinary Time.

In Sunday's Gospel reading, we hear of how Jesus gave authority to His disciples to lead the early church after He had returned to heaven. Jesus told them that whatever they accepted on earth would be accepted in heaven but whatever they forbid on earth would also be forbidden in heaven.

Jesus also told them that, whenever two or more of His followers were gathered together in His name, He would be there with them.

Whenever we come together to pray, we do so as one family, knowing that Jesus is with us in our prayer. Jesus assures us, through this Gospel reading, that God the Father will answer any prayer offered by several people when they ask for the same thing.

One of the most important messages of this Gospel reading is the need to come together as community, to gather as one with each other, and with Jesus. This is the way to communion with God.

#### Values Focus: Environment - Week 8

A popular Toyota television ad sees a father and daughter share different opinions on the uprooting by a storm of an apple tree from their front yard. The father sees it as a chance to finally have his harbour views unimpeded and has it removed; the daughter's view is that it bears fruit, is a living thing and provides a home for various animal species. She is clearly saddened by the loss.

As a way to ease her pain she plants an apple seed in the vacant hole. The "feel good factor" comes where the father sees his daughter's distress and overnight, plants a new apple tree, creating the illusion that one has sprung up while the family slept. The look on the girl's face is priceless.

The message? Learn not to fully control nature, but co-exist. Think how our actions will affect other species of plants and animals that keep our environment and its biodiversity in balance. What we do shouldn't threaten their existence.
